Boat trips and the Quayside

Ask at the Welcome Desk about our 45-minute boat trips along the Gloucester and Sharpness Canal on Queen Boadicea II, a Dunkirk Little Ship.

The boat leaves from the quayside where you can find historic cranes and boats and also get a great view of the warehouses of the Gloucester Docks. Sabrina 5, one of the largest boats in our collection, is permanently moored on the quayside and doubles up as a fully accessible education and exhibition space.

Access at the Museum

The National Waterways Museum, Gloucester is housed in an old warehouse with uneven and worn flooring. The quayside is a working area and may be uneven and slippery in wet or icy weather.

The main museum warehouse is fully accessible for wheelchair users. Queen Boadicea II's gangplank is too narrow for most electric wheelchairs, so she's only accessible for manual wheelchairs. Please ask a member of our team if you need any help.

The Severn Trow


The centrepiece is a 6m rope recreation of a Severn Trow – unique to the area. The trow's flat bottom design allowed it to sail through the shallow sections of the river


Dock model

- 1. The River Severn. Learn more about the story of the people and boats that worked on Britain's longest river.
- 2. Gloucester Docks. See what it was like to work in the UK's largest inland
- 3. Horse Power. Discover how boats were pulled by men or horses and then powered by engines.
- 4. Boat Building and Repair. Find out how boats were first built from wood and then metal.
- 5. The Gloucester & Sharpness Canal. Once the largest canal in England, but why was it built and what impact did it have on the port of Gloucester?
- 6. Canal Maintenance. Discover how canals were kept open by dredging, repair work and how divers were involved
- 7. The Severn and Canal Carrying Company and the Cadbury Family. Find out how the chocolate makers used boats to transport their goods along the waterways.
- Waterways at War. Understand the vital role Gloucester Docks and the River Severn playedduring World War Two.
- 9. Canal Management. Who managed and policed the canals, how was water supplied and how were tolls measured?
- 10. Going Up Country. See how narrowboats took goods from Gloucester Docks into the industrial Midlands
- 11. Leisure. As trade on the canals declined, see how this was replaced by people using them for leisure.
